



Standard Operating Procedure

Open Field Test - Individual

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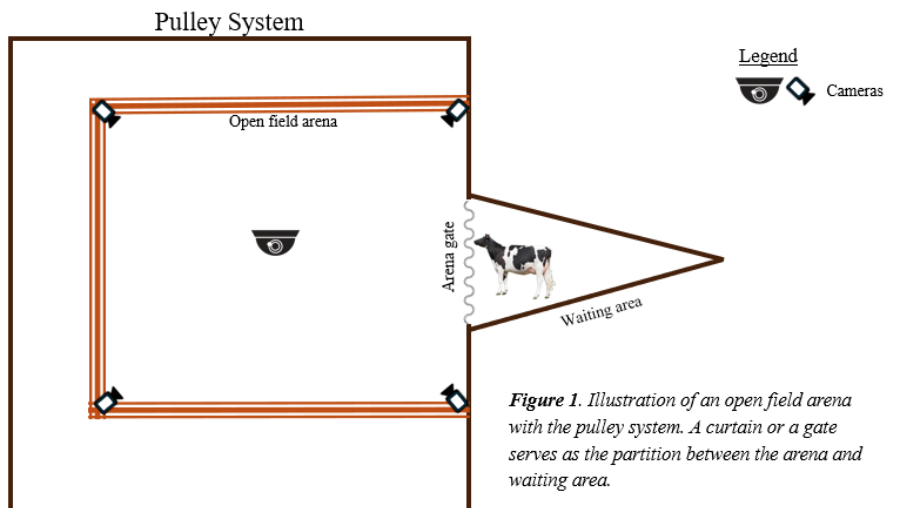
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Description/objective

The Open Field Test (OFT) evaluates animals' behavioral responses when placed in an unfamiliar environment. The test measures individual differences in exploratory behavior, activity levels, and responses to isolation and novelty. This test can be performed in different environments and can be designed to test a single animal or multiple animals in one testing session. It is adaptable to all age classes. *The test procedure described in this SOP is performed in an open field arena on a single animal.*

Terminology

Open-field arena	The open field arena must be designed to ensure both animal safety and appropriate test conditions. It must be enclosed by walls of sufficient height to prevent the animal from seeing over them or escaping; these walls must be opaque and may include a colored pattern to provide visual contrast. The floor must be non-slippery (e.g., covered with rubber mats) to ensure secure footing and reduce the risk of injury. The arena should be located away from other animals' housing areas to minimize external disturbances and distractions. It must be large enough to allow free movement, with a surface area at least twice that of the biggest animal being tested.  Figure 1. Illustration of an open field arena with the pulley system. 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Requirements

✓ Personnel (n = 3–5):

Personnel	Number	Role
Testing assistant(s)	1-2	Responsible for time management of the test, open and close the gate and record animals' vocalization during the test.
Camera manager(s)	1	Responsible of managing the camera operation (i.e., installing the cameras, validating the views and starting/stopping the recording).
Trained handler	1-2	Responsible for handling animals during transfer to and from the open field arena and for placing animals into the arena at the start of testing. Assist with guiding animals into the arena when necessary.

✓ **Materials Needed:**

- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Camera(s)
- Power source for camera(s) (i.e., extension cords, power bank with AC outlet)
- Stopwatch
- Whiteboard
- Dry erased marker

General information

- **Location:** Open field arena described in terminology.
- **Lighting and noise conditions:** The test environment must be sufficiently and uniformly (to avoid lateralization bias) illuminated to ensure a clear video recording of the animal. To perform a reliable and reproducible test all potential distractions must be avoided, as such the presence of non-essential personnel and any unnecessary noise during testing are strictly prohibited.
- **Camera positioning:** Camera should be positioned to perfectly cover the full surface of the arena. Overhead and side views are suggested which helps to capture all angles of the animal.
- **Animal preparation:** Whenever possible, animals should be habituated to routine handling and to the transport route prior to testing, in order to minimize stress and variability associated with handling and transport. However, animals must not be exposed to the new environment prior to testing so that the novelty of the test environment is preserved.
- **Test order preparation:** If the test is to be repeated to improve efficiency and maintain a consistent schedule across tests, a predetermined random testing order should be established. However, if the test is conducted only once, establishing such an order may not be necessary.

NOTE: For repeated testing, a different arena should be used whenever possible. If this is not feasible, the arena environment should be modified (e.g., with coloured tape, cardboard shapes, or other visual alterations on the walls) to maintain novelty.

Procedure

1. A camera manager initiates recording for all cameras and verifies that the field of view for each camera is correctly aligned to ensure full coverage of the arena surface.
2. A camera manager writes on the whiteboard the information that will allow to identify the video (animal ID, test being conducted, date and time) and displays it in all camera views.
3. A trained handler walks the animal into the waiting area of the arena (Figure 1) and then a testing assistant starts a 30-second wait period to allow the animal to settle.
4. After 30 seconds has passed, testing assistant(s) open the gate to allow the animal enters the arena.
5. After the 30-second wait period, a testing assistant opens the arena gate to allow the animal to enter the arena voluntarily. If the animal does not enter after 30 seconds, it can be encouraged to do so by a trained handler following the steps below. If the step is unsuccessful after 30 seconds, the handler moves onto the next:
 - Step 1:** Use vocalization (i.e., talking to the animal with regular voice volume) and hand gestures (i.e., soft hand clapping).
 - Step 2:** Use gentle tactile stimulation (i.e., touching the animal on the rump).
 - Step 3:** Physically prompt the animal to move into the arena (i.e., putting your hands on the animal's rump and using consistent forward motion to encourage the animal to move forward into the arena).
 - Step 4:** If the animal is still unwilling to enter the arena, the trained handler walks it back to its home environment and a second attempt is made later.
6. Once the animal in the arena, a testing assistant closes the gate while another starts a 3-minute timer for the test.
7. After the 3-minute test period has elapsed, the test is concluded, a camera manager stops the recording, and a trained handler walks the animal back to its home environment.
8. Before testing another animal, the arena must be cleaned, urine and/or feces must be removed when applicable, and the floor must be dried and the arena gate closed.
9. Repeat the procedure for each animal.



Safety Note

All personnel should maintain proper distance from test animals to stay safe and not distract them.
All personnel should remain calm and avoid sudden movements to prevent startling the animals.
Surface of the arena should be safe and the gates be sturdy enough to withstand unpredictable behaviour of the animals.
